"THE GOLDEN AGE of STEAM"

In the mid-1900s the dominance of sailing ships in global trade and warfare culminated when the steam engine became the iconic invention of the industrial revolution 1760 – 1840. [The latter was previously powered by water wheels.] This was the transition from man-made goods to machines. Experiments in steam production in the 17th century turned, by the middle of the 19th, into a technology which powered ships and trains, drove factories of the industrial world, ran mining drills, carriages, water pumps and many other applications.

Steam ships and steam boats were a huge provider of people and goods transportation, but by the 20th century, trains, planes and automobiles made steamboats all but obsolete. In the 1950s many shipping companies switched to more efficient and powerful diesel engines. Eg. Large cruise ships. However, some large naval vessels and submarines continue to be operated with steam turbines, using nuclear reactors to boil the water.



Our Guest Speaker Noel Phelan. We first met Noel with his previous presentations to us on "The Halvorsen Story" and "The Sinking and Salvaging of The Costa Concordia". He was excellent.

Noel is a Team Leader at the Australian National Maritime Museum and has had a close connection with the water all his life.
